City delivery updates

n this month's article, I would like to discuss a pilot program recently initiated by the Postal Service because of a law affecting many nursing mothers in the workplace. I also will provide an update on Next Generation Delivery Vehicles (NGDVs) and the ongoing Canoo LDV 190 vehicle pilot.

Lactation pods—On Dec. 29, 2022, President Joe Biden signed the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 into law. This law included the Providing Urgent Maternal Protections for Nursing Mothers Act (PUMP Act) providing nearly all Fair Labor Standards Act-covered employees the right to take needed time and

to access an appropriate space to express breast milk for a nursing child for up to one year after the child's birth.

In August of this year, NALC received notification that the Postal Service intends to pilot 10 lactation pods in several postal facilities for use by nursing mothers. USPS explains that the pilot program has been initiated to further en-

hance the organization's compliance with the PUMP Act.

The following Postal Service facilities have received special pods to provide privacy for employees who need to express milk: post offices in Allentown, PA, and Joliet, IL; the New Jersey Network Distribution Center; and the processing and distribution centers in Chicago, Detroit, Los Angeles, North Houston, Phoenix, and Royal Palm in Miami. USPS states that utilization of the pods in these facilities, and another facility yet to be determined, will be assessed during a period of six months following delivery of the pods.

I have spoken with NALC representatives at local and regional offices to confirm that a lactation pod has been delivered to the Allentown and Joliet post offices where city carriers are located. Early feedback regarding use of the pods has been

received from only a small number of carriers, since the pods have been delivered to only two post offices. The feedback received from those offices has been positive and constructive.

Next Generation Delivery Vehicle (NGDV)—Also in August, the Postal Service sent notification confirming that overall testing of the NGDV was completed, Vehicle Maintenance and Safety Drivers Instructor training has been finalized, and NGDVs are in the process of being delivered to offices in the field. With this notification, the Postal Service provided a deployment list for the NGDVs through October 2024. The list details USPS plans to deploy a total of 81 NGDVs (11 Battery Electric Vehicles and 70 Internal Combustion Engine vehicles) to offices in Georgia, Indiana, Texas, Washington, Pennsylvania, Florida, Michigan, Illinois and Colorado; however, the list was subject to change.

The Sorting and Delivery Center (S&DC) in Athens, GA, received the first delivery of the NGDV in June. Recently, I visited the Athens S&DC along with Special Assistant to the President Douglas Lape to observe carriers as they began to operate their new vehicles. First reactions by carriers using the NGDV have been very positive. Canoo vehicle pilot program update—In the April edition of *The Postal Record*, I informed the membership of the Postal Service's intent to pilot test the use of the Canoo model

Lifestyle Delivery Vehicle (LDV) 190 on carrier routes at the Athens S&DC. The Canoo LDV 190 is a battery electric commercial off-the-shelf vehicle with almost 172 cubic feet of cargo space. During my recent visit to the Athens S&DC, a few carriers involved in the pilot provided their feedback on the vehicle. Overall, the carriers like using the Canoo LDV 190. The vehicle's easy handling, modern camera views and air conditioning features (of course) received





the highest approval ratings from the carriers. Struggles to fit large packages into the cargo area, carpet flooring, insufficient interior lighting and the inability to walk inside of the cargo area were some of the downsides shared by the carriers. Testing of the vehicle began in April and is expected

OPM has a handy FEGLI calculator on its website at opm. gov/retirement-center/calculators/fegli-calculator so that each person can weigh their current coverage and decide if they want to continue that coverage and which options to elect at retirement. Some find the premiums of FEGLI cost prohibitive as they retire and age. Some find the premiums of additional optional FEGLI cost prohibitive as they retire and age, and elect to keep only Basic (and Standard option, if they have it) in retirement. In addition, other programs such as the NALC Mutual Benefit Association, offer a wide range of policies, not just term life insurance.
